

Eligibility

Submissions are encouraged from any and all graduate students in Public Health enrolled in Fall 2019 in an accredited School or College of Public Health or an ASPPH-affiliated Public Health Program (aspph.org).

Background

More than 3000 empirical studies of religion/spirituality (R/S) and health have now been published, including more than 100 systematic reviews and meta-analyses – see 13 empirical reviews in 2018 book

Longevity differentials of nearly 14 years added life have been linked to R/S factors. Other health professions such as medicine and psychology have made major strides in addressing R/S factors in teaching and research. National surveys indicate that public health educational leaders are receptive to teaching about the topic, and that public health students want more information. This contest aims to foster broader awareness of the vast R/S-health evidence base. and its relevance to Public Health as a field.

Essays should be between 1000 and 2000 words in length. Entries must be uploaded no later than Sunday, January 5, 2020.*

Topics

Essays must discuss relations between spirituality/religion and Public Health, situating their arguments in the context of the more than 3000 published empirical studies of R/S and health. Example topics:

- How can collaborations with religious communities empower populations to attain better health?
- How would community-based Public Health Education change if R/S factors were fully taken into account?
- In what ways are R/S factors relevant to improving wellestablished health behavior X or preventing the incidence of disease Y in population Z?
- What would be the nature of a new Public Health that better acknowledges R/S factors?
- How strong is the evidence that any dimension of spirituality or religion is a "fundamental cause" of health in the sense articulated by Link and Phelan (1995)?*

Criteria for Judging

Winning essays should be clearly written and should

- Include a clear thesis statement and its support
- Refer to empirical literature on R/S-health
- Explain health relevance
- Articulate Public Health relevance beyond perspectives of individually-focused health fields (e.g., medicine, psychology)*
